Background: Chabot College was approached by a national foundation to launch the first Bay Area summer camp to encourage youth to learn about careers in machining and manufacturing. East Bay industries have a keen interest in establishing this youth program in the Bay Area and will participate in the summer camp. During two four-day weeks in Summer 2012, the camp will focus on skills and motivation for 12 to 15 campers between the ages of 12 and 14 through training provided by Chabot faculty. The NBT staff will assist with marketing and evaluation.

Approval of Agreement—Paramedics Plus (Alameda County) for the Emergency

Medical Technician Program, Las Positas College

<u>Background</u>: The College requires students in the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Program to successfully complete field internships. Paramedics Plus has taken over the contract with Alameda County previously held by American Medical Response (AMR) which has been the service provider since 2004 for the EMT Field Internship Program while students participate in the College's program. This agreement is identical to the agreement previously held with American Medical Response (AMR).

The purpose of this agreement is to confirm the respective responsibilities and duties of the District and Paramedics Plus while students are participating in Field Internship Programs with Paramedics Plus. Paramedics Plus will provide field internships for the purpose of training students enrolled in the Las Positas College Emergency Medical Technician Program. There is no cost to the College for the participation of its students in the Field Internship Program.

The term of the three-year agreement is February 1, 2012 through January 31, 2015.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed agreement with Paramedics Plus (Alameda County) for the Emergency Medical Technician Program, Las Positas College, for the term commencing February 1, 2012 through January 31, 2015. <u>Background</u>: The College desires its Paramedic Program students to obtain practical experience at hospital facilities through participation in a hospital program for Paramedic Clinical Education at Eden Medical Center facilities, which include Eden Hospital and San Leandro Hospital.

The purpose of this agreement is to confirm the respective responsibilities and duties of the District and Eden Medical Center while students are participating in a hospital program for Paramedic Clinical Education at Eden Medical Center facilities. Eden Medical Center will provide supervised and appropriate clinical experiences for students enrolled in the Las Positas Paramedic Program. There is no cost to the College for the participation of its students in the Paramedic Clinical Education Program.

The term of the three year agreement is July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2015.

Recommended Action: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed agreement with Eden Medical Center for the Paramedic Program, Las Positas College, for the term commencing July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2015. Approval to Increase the Student Health Center Fee at Chabot and Las Positas

Colleges

<u>Background</u>: The Assistant Vice Chancellor from the California Community College Systems Office issued a memorandum dated August 20, 2011 to support a one dollar increase in the student health fees, and that districts may begin charging a maximum fee of \$18.00 per semester and \$15.00 for summer session based on calculations by the Financial, Economic, and Demographic Unit in the Department of Finance.

With this being passed from the Chancellor's Office, it is proposed to increase the student health fee to both Chabot and Las Positas Colleges by raising the fee from \$14 to \$17 per semester, and from \$9 to \$15 for the summer session starting Summer 2012.

With the current economic conditions and budget cuts from state funding sources, increasing the mandatory student health services fee will allow Student Health Centers to continue providing accessible health and counseling needs to meet the high number of student demand for services. It will also help to continue supporting the health campus wellness and mental health programs, and to staff a coordinator position to provide the students in aiding health promotion and education on campus.

For students to enjoy and succeed during their academic career, early treatment to healthcare is vitally important. Disease prevention is more likely to occur when barriers like high costs are removed and a preventive approach to healthcare is adopted. All enrolled students are provided affordable, convenient access to primary health care through Student Health & Wellness Services.

The Student Health Centers at both colleges are consistently highly used and rated by students. Over 10,000 students annually use the Student Health Center at Chabot College and nearly 5,000 students at Las Positas College. Over 3,000 students annually utilized front desk services by providing them free over-the-counter medications, band-aids and first aid treatment. With the absence of medical insurance coverage from the majority of our student population, it accounts for much of the heavy student demand for on-campus health services.

Health care costs and health care insurance costs have increased at a staggering rate. Chabot and Las Positas Student Health Centers have not had a rate increase in over 4 years while costs have increased dramatically every year. Based on a survey that HSACCC (Health Science Association of California Community College) conducted in 2009 from 55 community colleges, 72% of these colleges are charging the maximum health fee while Chabot and Las Positas still falls in the 9%

category of charging \$14 student health fee for Fall and Spring Semester. In fact, some colleges such as Ohlone and Pierce College, have acquired a board approved policy to automatically charge the maximum allowable fees as approved by the Chancellor's Office in accordance with the Education Code.

If the Student Health Center fee had been adjusted for inflationary increases over this four-year period, a fee initiative to increase the student fee would not have been necessary. Even with the proposed fee increase, the annual cost to a student for unlimited access to the Student Health Center is low when compared to a single visit to a clinic, physician or hospital emergency room.

Without the increase in the Student Health Center fee, services to students would be drastically reduced, and many students would suffer, physically, emotionally and fiscally. Such a reduction could result in many students not receiving necessary, timely and low cost medical services. They would become more dependent on expensive hospital, urgent care and off campus outpatient services and an increase in student illnesses resulting in academic failure.

Last semester, a student came to Chabot Student Health Center and was diagnosed as having new cancer. A delay in service for situations like these can be catastrophic. Every year there are examples of students who are identified by Student Health Center medical providers who have serious medical conditions such as cancers, infections, or mental health crisis where early treatment is very important and even lifesaving.

It is because the Student Health Center is such a vital service in supporting students, academic success and because the fee supporting those services has not increased in over four years, the Board of Trustees is being asked to support and approve this proposal.

<u>Recommended Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed increase to the student health fee to \$15 for Summer Semester, and \$17 for Fall and Spring Semesters which will support the student health and wellness program in providing accessible health and counseling needs of students at Chabot and Las Positas Colleges.

Approval of Award to Purchase Olympus Microscopes for Science Building

<u>Background</u>: District and Staff has determined that the limited sources of supply results received from Market Survey conducted is in the best interest of the District to purchase 144 Olympus Microscopes from Olympus America, Inc, located in Center Valley, PA, the exclusive authorized distributor of Olympus Instructional Microscopes.

Approval of Award of a Piggyback Contract for Furniture and Equipment for Las

Positas College, Building 1850, Using the CollegeBuys Purchasing Program

<u>Background</u>: District Staff is preparing for the purchase, delivery and installation of furniture for Las Positas College, Building 1850. To make the purchase of most of the required furniture items, the piggyback contracting method has been selected. Public Contract Code Section 20652 authorizes the use of this method when it is in the best interest of the District.

The CollegeBuys Purchasing Program is a cooperative purchasing program made available by the Foundation for California Community Colleges. The CollegeBuys contract planned for this use is the furniture contract with Krueger International, Inc. This piggybackable contract utilizes a previously conducted bidding process and contract award of the San Mateo Community College District.

Recommended Action: That the Board of Trustees approves the award of a piggyback contract for furniture and equipment for Las Positas College, Building 1850, using the CollegeBuys Purchasing Program, to Krueger International, Inc. of Green Bay, Wisconsin, in the respective amounts including taxes, not to exceed \$87,190.26. <u>Background</u>: The Student Senate (ASLPC) has approved the development of their own web site. Las Positas College would like to enter into a contract with WSI for the development and maintenance of said web site.

The goal of developing an ASLPC web site is to increase the visibility of ASLPC and their role at the college. In order to meet this goal, the expertise of a web designer is required. Through the web site, the visibility of the ASLPC and the work they do for students will be increased. A professionally designed web site will allow the students and the student leaders to have a more productive relationship, and will hopefully increase participation in student life. Through the ASLPC web site, the students will be informed about upcoming events and activities.

In addition, the web site will provide updates of the most recently passed or in-progress legislation that may either directly or indirectly impact the student body and will present important campus issues. The students will be able to express their concerns and thoughts online. This will allow students to collaborate with each other with a discussion board, a marketplace, FAQ's, etc. The website will be monitored by the ASLPC.

<u>Recommendation Action</u>: That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed agreement with WSI Smart Solutions for the development of an ASLPC web site, Las Positas College. It is further recommended that the Board authorize the Vice Chancellor, Business Services, to execute this agreement on behalf of the District.

Approval of Contract with Southland Industries for Energy Savings Projects,

<u>Background</u>: On May 1, 2007 the Board of Trustees approved issuance of an Energy Services Agreement with Southland Industries. On August 21, 2007 the Board of Trustees authorized Southland Task Orders for specific scopes of work to design and build a new Central Utility Plant (CUP) facility at Chabot College and Las Positas College. Both CUP facilities are now complete and operational providing heating and cooling to campus facilities.

This proposed contract will provide energy savings projects derived from connecting additional buildings at Chabot College and Las Positas College to their Central Utility Plant, Improvements to the Central Plant Operations, District-Wide process improvements and a demonstration conversion of building florescent lighting to LED lighting. These energy savings projects are estimated to provide the District \$140,000 in annual energy savings, generate PG&E energy savings incentives, and reduce annual maintenance expenses.

<u>Recommended Action:</u> That the Board of Trustees approves the proposed Contract with Southland Industries of Union City, California for Energy Savings Projects, District-Wide in an amount not to exceed \$2,850,000. It is further recommended that the Board authorizes the Vice Chancellor, Business Services, to execute the contract on behalf of the District.

Approval to Negotiate a Professional Services Contract for Parcel Tax and

General Obligation Bond Polling Services

Background: The District is considering a parcel tax and general obligation bond measure to be placed on the November 2012 ballot. In advance of the passage of the appropriate resolution by the Board of Trustees which will formally approve the placement of the parcel tax and general obligation bond measure before the voters, a polling of the electorate is necessary. The strategy for such an information effort has lead to a success rate of greater than 90 percent for California public education. Districts customarily seek professional assistance from firms specializing in this work.

The three responsive firms for this RFP are as follows:

- 1. Center for Community Opinion/Political Designs, San Ramon, California
- 2. Godbe Research, San Mateo, California
- 3. William Berry Campaigns (WBC), Sacramento, California

This approval will be followed by interviews of each firm by the Chancellor's Council, a shared governance group, in order to select a firm and subsequently negotiate a Professional Services Contract with "not to exceed" budget of \$35,000 for Parcel Tax and General Obligation Bond Polling Services.
