Congratulations! I am pleased to inform you that on March 8, 2012 the Alameda County Workforce Investment Board (ACWIB) approved the following:

1. Chabot-Las Positas Community College has been selected as the provider of WIA Employment Plus II Youth Services for the Tri-Cities Areas (Union City, Fremont and Newark) of Alameda County for the period of July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013;

The County reserves the right to reduce the amount of consideration to be paid under this contract if it does not receive adequate funds from the State of California. Under such circumstances, a corresponding adjustment in services to be rendered by Contractor will be made by mutual agreement of the parties.


A contract package will be forwarded to your organization no later than **June 12, 2012**. No invoice payments can be made until the entire contracting process has been completed and both parties have signed all required documents. Review and approval of the contract package by County staff must occur before the Alameda County Board of Supervisors' designated representative schedules the contract for County signature. Please review exhibits A through G of the contract packet, as there have been some additions to these documents about which contractors should be aware.

In addition, the following issue must be addressed in the Contract prior to completion:

1. If your agency's "Identified Signatory" has changed, your agency must have a Board Resolution Authorizing the person to sign contracts on behalf of the agency. The resolution must be attached to the packet.
2. Insurance coverage must be current and must include endorsement of additional insured as specified in Exhibit C of the contract package.

<p>1. <u>New Enrollments:</u> Youth Providers shall meet 50% of PY 12-13 Enrollments by December 2012 and 100% of their Enrollment Goals for PY12-13 by February 28, 2013</p> <p>2. <u>Foster Youth Service Goals:</u> 1) The number of foster youth to be served by the entire Local Workforce Investment Area will be 15% and the same for each PY12-13 youth service provider; 2) 100% of Foster Youth enrollments must be met by February 28, 2013; 3) Contractors will develop a stronger relationship with Alameda County Foster Care Services to accept appropriate referrals for youth who may be eligible for WIA services; and 4) Contractors agree that applicants who do not meet enrollment requirements or who cannot be served for any other reason <u>will be</u> referred to other appropriate programs.</p> <p>3. <u>Performance/Common Measure Goals:</u> Performance goals are subject to change pending final notification from the State. The State allows for annual Performance Goal negotiations with the Local Workforce Investment Areas. Until the negotiations are complete, the program providers are responsible to meet performance goals from the previous program year. An updated Performance Goal sheet will be issued. The program providers are then responsible for meeting the updated goals.</p> <p>4. <u>One Stop System Connections:</u> Each EPP II Contractor is required to develop linkages to One Stop Career Centers in their geographical areas to ensure a seamless employment and training system for youth who become adults. Youth 18-21 years of age and older have a choice to receive services through a One Stop or through the EPP II providers. Contractor is encouraged to develop a Memorandum of Understanding with One Stops in their local area to meet the unique needs of their communities and employers.</p> <p>5. <u>Leveraging of WIA Dollars:</u> It is recommended that contractors leverage WIA dollars by developing a more diverse stream of funding and/or increase fundraising activities.</p>
